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

PETER HEGEDÜS

PETER HEGEDÜS' FILMMAKING CAREER SPANS OVER 25 YEARS. HE HAS BEEN MAKING FILMS SINCE THE AGE OF 17 EXPLORING HUMAN STORIES THAT SHED LIGHT ON IDENTITY. PLACE AND BELONGING. HIS WORK IS CHARACTERIZED BY A COMMITMENT TO SOCIAL JUSTICE BE THEY DOCUMENTARY OR DRAMA.

PETER'S WORK HAS BEEN SHOWN AT MAJOR FILM FESTIVALS AROUND THE WORLD INCLUDING ONE OF HIS DOCUMENTARIES INHERITANCE A FISHERMAN'S STORY BEING SHORTLISTED FOR THE ACADEMY AWARDS AND HIS LATEST 360 IMMERSIVE STORY SORELLA'S STORY PREMIERED IN-COMPETITION AT THE PRESTIGIOUS VENICE INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL. SORELLA'S STORY

Sorella's Story, an immersive 360 short film, is part of a unique package of multi-platform screen content that aims to utilise innovative screen technology to connect and educate young people about the Holocaust and its impact on our world today.

This short film - selected in competition at the Venice International Film Festival - brings to life a smuggled atrocity photograph from Latvia in December 1941 that depicts a group of women and a child before their execution. In this immersive film, the audience follows 10-year-old Sorella on her final journey to the beach on the Baltic Sea where close to 4,000 people, mostly women and children, were murdered.

With the advancement of technology, the explosion of online content, and emergence of streaming services, audiences have more choice about where, when, and how they want to consume media. Multi-platform storytelling utilising new technologies has the potential to reach a wider and more diverse range of audiences. Further, generation Z (young people succeeding Millennials) has shown that they are comfortable with emerging technologies demonstrating more control over the media they consume. By creating content for the platforms they are most likely to engage in, we can capture their attention.

By unpacking our multi-platform approach, specifically discussing the immersive film Sorella's Story in conjunction with the two other companion pieces titled To Never Forget and In Their Name, we hope to demonstrate how immersive technology can amplify storytelling, catering particularly for social justice topics and themes. We also aim to highlight how immersive storytelling can have significant impact on emotionally engaging viewers, resulting in deeper connection to the subject whilst laying the groundwork for future classroom learning in history and social sciences.

QUT - DIGITAL MEDIA RESEARCH CENTRE

Professor Michael Dezuanni undertakes research about digital media, literacies and learning in home, school and community contexts. He is the Program Leader for Digital Inclusion and Participation for QUT's Digital Media Research Centre which produces world-leading research for a creative, inclusive and fair digital media environment.

Professor Patrik Wikstrom is a Professor of Communication, a computational social scientist and Director of QUT Digital Media Research Centre at Queensland University of Technology in Brisbane, Australia. He studies how digital technologies shape music cultures and economies. Most of his work over the past few years has been about how recommender systems shape the consumption and production of digital culture. He is a computational social scientist with a passion for developing computational tools and methods for fellow social science and humanities researchers.

Prof. Daniel Angus is Professor of Digital Communication in the School of Communication, and leader of the Computational Communication and Culture program in QUT's Digital Media Research Centre. His research focuses on the development and application of visual computational analysis methods in communication and media studies, with a specific focus on conversation and social media data.

Dr Amanda Levido is a Research Fellow in the ARC Centre of Excellence for the Digital Child where her research focusses on what media literacy looks like in the early years, in both school and care settings, particularly as children engage creatively with new media digital technologies. Amanda's previous experience includes consulting on the Media Arts strand of the Australian Curriculum: The Arts. In 2021, she completed her PhD which examined how the Media Arts curriculum was implemented in primary school settings.

DIGITAL MEDIA RESEARCH CENTRE MASTERCLASS

This masterclass will focus on how researchers at the cutting edge of media and communications studies approach studying digital media. In particular it will focus on:

- Studying digital media platforms (TikTok, Spotify etc), with a focus on recommender systems. This section will outline what a recommender system is (and why it is important to care about these things); how they shape users' experiences on the platforms; associated risks; how to study recommender systems.
- Studying algorithms and media audiences with a focus on the advertising observatory established by the Centre of Excellence for Automated Decision Making and Society.
- Studying microcelebrity and social media entertainment. The section will outline the concept of social media entertainment (SME) and the role played by microcelebrities in SME ecosystems.

MR ZACHARY LURJE

Zachary Lurje is a Brisbane based screenwriter, producer, animator, script supervisor and teacher. He was the 2022 recipient of the Epic Games and Screen Queensland Short Film Challenge with his animated short, 'Road to Pride'. Zachary tutors in animation and virtual production at Queensland University of Technology and is committed to telling engaging and authentic stories that embrace virtual production.

CREATE YOURSELF AS A 3D CHARACTER.

Create yourself as a 3D metahuman character. This is a crash course using one virtual production workflow - from real face to life-like animated character. Using a smart phone, participants will create a 3D model of their face using photogrammetry techniques and the Polycam app. Then in Metahuman Creator, participants will sculpt the character before importing the character into Unreal Engine on the studio computers. In Unreal Engine participants can experiment with animating their character. Participants will need to create a free account with Epic Games to access Metahuman Creator and Unreal Engine and download the free Polycam app to their smart phone. Participants will also need a USB stick for transferring large files and email that is accessible online using the studio computer.

Explore the language of virtual production and the emergent skill sets required in the film industry. Understand the iterative approaches to filmmaking using a VP pipeline as opposed to the traditional linear pipeline.

DOCUMENTARY FILMMAKING ACROSS THE PRIMARY CURRICULUM

SINCE THE BIRTH OF CINEMA, DOCUMENTARY SERIES HAVE ENGAGED AUDIENCES OF ALL AGES AND ARE THE PERFECT MEDIUM TO DISSECT AND RECREATE IN THE PRIMARY CLASSROOM. ANALYSING AND CREATING DOCUMENTARY FILM COVERS THE MEDIA ARTS CURRICULUM AND, DEPENDING ON YOUR SUBJECT MATTER, CAN BE CONNECTED TO A UNIT IN SCIENCE, HASS, ENGLISH AND MUCH MORE.

IN THIS PRACTICAL WORKSHOP, WE BEGIN BY EXPLORING THE CODES AND CONVENTIONS OF DOCUMENTARY FILMMAKING USING THE TELEVISION SERIES, BUILT TO SURVIVE, AS OUR GUIDE. FOLLOWING THIS, TEACHERS WORK IN PRODUCTION TEAMS TO COMPLETE THE PRE-PRODUCTION, PRODUCTION AND POST-PRODUCTION STAGES TO CREATE THEIR OWN SHORT DOCUMENTARY FILM IN A FUN AND FAST-PACED ENVIRONMENT.

SHOOTING DIALOGUE IS A CRITICAL BUT CHALLENGING SKILL FOR STUDENTS TO MASTER. THIS PRESENTATION WILL SHARE STRATEGIES FOR DEVELOPING THE UNDERSTANDING AND TECHNICAL SKILL REQUIRED FOR STUDENTS TO CREATE MASTERFUL DIALOGUE SCENES, BUILDING ON CLASSES THAT HAVE BEEN HONED OVER A NUMBER OF YEARS. THE PRESENTATION FEATURES: INFORMATION ABOUT CONVENTIONAL, AND UNCONVENTIONAL APPROACHES, TO SHOOTING DIALOGUE; STRATEGIES FOR STUDENTS TO GET THE MOST OUT OF THEIR AUDIO; TECHNIQUES FOR REFINING DIALOGUE SCENES IN THE EDIT; AND SAMPLES OF STUDENT WORK. PARTICIPANTS WILL RECEIVE LESSON PLANS, PRESENTATIONS AND SAMPLE SCRIPTS SUITABLE FOR SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS.

DANIEL WILL PROVIDE AN ON-STAGE DEMONSTRATION OF INTERVIEW AND FILMING TECHNIQUE INCLUDING BASIC ON-LOCATION CAMERA AND MICROPHONE SET-UP.

Want to stimulate your students' creativity in productions and bring their unique personalities into play? Keen to challenge students of all abilities to collaborate on an exciting new production? Perhaps you'd like to engage your feeder school in a small project?

In this session I will share how I extended my Grade 9 Media Arts class to collaborate on mini Kids TV episodes with a local primary school. In addition to research and scriptwriting opportunities, this exciting unit incorporated essential production skills such as filming on location, instructing crew, directing actors, simple puppetry and voice acting skills. Using puppets of any kind can provide opportunities for student production work to be uniquely flexible and creative. By showing our productions, sharing experiences and discussing resources, I hope to encourage you try something new - because puppets are so much fun!

Unlike stop motion animation with materials such as clay or lego, cut out animation allows students to explore the horizons of animated storytelling and create without the constraints of gravity or physics in a way that is space-efficient (and affordable!) This session will showcase a variety of collaborative student work from junior secondary classrooms and will provide a time-proven framework for teaching this form of animation that achieves impressive results. Attendees will leave this session with practical tips and tricks that will allow them to teach this medium with confidence.

ALYSSA'S WORK FOCUSSES ON UTILISING THE RICH NATIONAL AV COLLECTION TO DEVELOP CRITICAL ENGAGEMENT WITH MEDIA IN CHILDREN AND ADULT LEARNERS ALIKE.

FRAMING AUSTRALIAN MEDIA: TEACHING MEDIA LITERACY USING THE NATIONAL AUDIO-VISUAL COLLECTION

THE NATIONAL FILM AND SOUND ARCHIVE COLLECTS, PRESERVES AND SHARES THE NATIONAL STORY THROUGH AUDIO-VISUAL MATERIAL. WITH NEARLY FOUR MILLION ITEMS, THE NFSA COLLECTION TRANSFORMS THESE RECORDS INTO 'LIVING MEMORIES' – THE MANY FACETS OF AUSTRALIA'S PEOPLES, CULTURES, IDEAS AND BELIEFS, BOTH OVER TIME AND ACROSS THE LAND. THIS SESSION EXPLORES THE WAYS IN WHICH TEACHERS CAN USE THE NFSA COLLECTION TO HONE THEIR STUDENTS' MEDIA LITERACY SKILLS AND TO CONSIDER HOW MEDIA SHAPES OUR NATIONAL IDENTITY IN ALL ITS COMPLEXITY AND DIVERSITY. THE SESSION WILL OUTLINE A FRAMEWORK FOR APPROACHING MEDIA LITERACY IN THE CLASSROOM WHICH WILL BE APPLIED TO MEDIA EXAMPLES FROM THE NFSA COLLECTION.

Dr Amanda Levido is a Research Fellow at the Australian Research Council Centre of Excellence for the Digital Child. Her PhD examined how media literacy and media arts is implemented in Australian primary schools. Amanda is interested in the pedagogical approaches used by teachers and educators when implementing media literacy and media arts in school and early years settings. Additionally, she has a research interest in how children use digital technology to learn in both school and out-of-school settings.

Amanda Bower is an award-winning journalist-turned-primary-teacher who works for Squiz Kids, Australia's premier news podcast for children. In 2022, she developed the Newshounds curriculum for Squiz Kids: a free eight-part media literacy adventure for primary school classrooms. Newshounds teaches kids to stop, think, and check before believing everything they see, hear, and read—and is the only media literacy program in Australia for primary schools.

STOP, THINK, AND CHECK: TEACHING PRIMARY MEDIA LITERACY

Are you one of the 96% of primary school teachers who want to teach media literacy skills in your classroom, but don't have either the time to create curriculum; the confidence to coach kids about fact-checking; or the ability to explore Facebook, Instagram, and other platforms behind your school's firewalls?

Squiz-E the Newshound has got you covered! In this session, Amanda Bower of Squiz Kids will take you through the free Newshounds curriculum: an eight part media literacy board game adventure that teaches students to be critical consumers and producers of media. This workshop will allow you, the teacher, to walk in a Newshounds student's shoes, as we learn how to stop, think, and check before we believe everything we see, hear, and read.

And if you're thinking "I don't have time to teach another thing," we'll also address why it's crucial to teach media literacy early, while kids are still getting most of their news and information through parents and teachers. We will also address how the program can support teachers to implement the Australian Curriculum through links to both Media Arts and English curricula. Finally, we'll present preliminary findings into a research study of the Newshounds program.

Kristina is a secondary film, television, and new media teacher. She has recently completed her Masters titled "The Evolution of Participatory Culture Through Interactive Storytelling on TikTok." Her interest in TikTok grew when her students showed her content from the platform. It became clear audience behaviours and expectations were evolving and will continue to evolve.

INTERACTIVE DOCUMENTARY FILMMAKING ON TIKTOK

TikTok offers audiences various methods to contribute to storytelling within the platform. There are TikTokers who purposely inspire their audiences to participate with their content, using audience input as suggestions for future videos. But what would a documentary made for TikTok like? Documentaries have always had participatory and self-reflexive as available modes of filmmaking, but what does that look like on TikTok? The presentation considers the traditional aspects of documentary filmmaking and adapts them for interactive storytelling on TikTok. The documentary itself follows the filmmaker as she learns about her mother's Filipino heritage after spending most of her life being brought up Australian.

ALTERNATIVE REALITY GAMES ON TIKTOK AND BEYOND

TikTok offers a low barrier of participation, creating easier opportunities for users to actively participate in the content they watch. As this type of participation becomes more commonplace, the intricacies increase. Alternative reality games (ARGs) create a real world out of fiction and encourage audience responses that inform the game's next experience. TikTok has a plethora of ARGs, mostly in the horror genre, which appears as regular vlog-like video content at first. Audience members start noticing clues throughout the video content, offering suggestions for the filmmaker. This presentation details the evolution of participatory culture through the lens of TikTok and continues through the exploration of ARGs as transmedia storytelling.

AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM V9.0 FOR THE SECONDARY TEACHER: REFRESHED, REORGANISED, AND AUTHENTIC.

This session is for secondary educators to inform them of the key changes to the Australian Curriculum. Building on the strong foundations of Version 8.4, Version 9 of The Arts learning area moves to a four-strand organising structure. The new structure will help teachers to understand the conceptual underpinnings and processes of arts pedagogy. The four strands of: Exploring and responding, Developing practices and skills, Creating and making, and Presenting and Performing will be unpacked and explored. Key differences in language and approaches, especially around First Nations' content, will be shared and explained. Protocols for the consideration of Indigenous Cultural and Intellectual Property rights (now a Years 7-8 content description) will be clarified. Media Arts in the secondary classroom is a highly relevant, dynamic, and creative space for young people as they navigate the digital world and their own identity.

SUPERPOWERED - UNPACKING A UNIT SUITABLE FOR 9/10 MEDIA.

Rob Masters will take you through the unit 'Superpowered' - suitable for Year 9 or 10 Media, but could easily be modified for younger grades or incorporated as part of Unit 2 or 3 in the senior syllabus.

This unit teaches students the basic principles of film theory and production through the representation of Superpowers, Sci-Fi tech and Magic, and their associated special effects. Students will explore the history of special effects from Georges Méliès to modern CGI. They will experiment with simple special effects techniques, leading towards making a short film from preproduction, through to filming and editing. The film will be based on the idea of superpowers (or advanced technology/magic), utilising their newfound special effects skills. Students will also analyse a recent film that has utilised advanced forms of these techniques. Participants will get a chance to experiment with some of these effects themselves in a hands-on workshop.

AUSTRALIAN CURRICULUM V9.0 FOR THE PRIMARY TEACHER: REFRESHED, REORGANISED, AND AUTHENTIC

How do we teach 'Digital Natives' about the platforms they spend their lives engaging with? A new century brings endless opportunities while also potentially bringing endless risks. The term "21st century children" conjures images of radical transformation for students, alongside fears and anxieties for the impact digital technologies may have on their development. As media teachers, we have a unique position to teach students about the emerging institutions, platforms, and issues that New Media has brought. Explicitly teaching digital literacy and issues to teenagers, "Control the Scroll" aims to educate young people in 21st Century Skills (more specifically, how to be positive examples of 'digital natives'). In this seminar, ideas are going to be shared surrounding using media in junior secondary to create programs of assessment with the explicit purpose of teaching 'digital natives' how to be active and informed citizens in their virtual world.
